If you want to know what it is like to work as a volunteer with IDEAS and TecAp, the former volunteers relate that in their own words.



Name: Jennifer Sarpong

<u>University</u>: Emory University – Major – Interdisciplinary Studies- Socioeconomics, Minor- Community Building & Social Change

Products created:

- Created 7 development case studies from real-world microfranchises and social enterprise projects using PowerPoint, which were used for training in Nicaragua.
- Researched foundation guidelines and information, and created lists of potential funding sources for the TecAp social enterprise in Nicaragua

Where worked: Part-time, Virtually

Worked for: Volunteer Resume experience, eventually was hired part-time

Language: I did all my work in English but several of the case studies were translated to Spanish for use in developmental trainings

<u>What it meant to me and my professional development</u>: I got to understand more about what it takes to bring about sustainable development and change in communities while making a difference by providing materials that helped others learn about social change. I would one day like to start my own social enterprise in Africa, so the depth of understanding I received while compiling the case studies is invaluable. I also volunteered doing part-time research on behalf of IDEAS to identify potential resources for its TecAp social enterprise that helps rural families, women, and youth in Nicaragua create sustainable futures for themselves through various income-generating projects.

As a result of the work and research I did, I was eventually was hired as part-time as a contractor for IDEAS to find potential funding sources and write grants. This experience has been crucial to my personal development. As I am now applying to grad school, I was able to list this experience in my statement of purpose. Also because of my good work, a member of the IDEAS Board of Directors who teaches at the school I applied to in New York directly recommended me to my top grad school.

<u>Why You Should Volunteer With Ideas</u>: IDEAS represents and amazing opportunity to volunteer with an international NGO right at home through virtual technology. Because it is not a huge NGO, but still has

an international reach, you will get valuable first-hand exposure to the non-profit world and professionals engaged in the work of change. IDEAS is a small organization making a big impact by transforming thousands of lives internationally through training, microfinance, and development. You don't necessarily need to be fluent in Spanish, have a degree in business, or travel to an office every day to make a difference here. The IDEAS staff is genuine, dedicated, and most of all flexible. Whatever your talents are, chances are they can be used to help IDEAS tangibly transform the world.

<u>University</u>: Williams College in Massachusetts. Major in Political Economy, Concentration in Leadership Studies. Senior year.

Products created:

- Catalog of small solar powered items with their technical specifications.
 Was translated to Spanish to be used with TecAp.
- Researched list of solar-powered item manufacturers. Contacted some to for shipping and cost information.



- Created documents in PowerPoint and PDF to be used for a graduate course on microfranchising taught at the American University in Nicaragua by Dr. Garber and Gabriel Gaitan.
- Edited and prepared other IDEAS communications materials.

Worked: Part-time at IDEAS office, supplemented by virtual work from home.

<u>Received</u>: Stipend; and was eligible for funding from my college.

<u>Language</u>: I did all my work in English but my high school Spanish came in handy as we were preparing documents for a graduate course in Spanish. However, language skills were not required.

<u>What my time at IDEAS taught me</u>: IDEAS is a place where I was able to take what I had learned in college about developmental economics and apply it to my work. However, importantly, I didn't need any specific coursework to benefit from working at IDEAS. The flexibility in my work (often, my job was to create a product, not to follow any specific formula or practice) required a lot of creativity. I had to learn to balance my competing desires to create the best product possible, but also to get through my entire to-do list.

<u>Other Comments</u>: Working at IDEAS was a fantastic way to spend part of my summer. The freedom and creativity required for my work allowed me to develop strong skills of communication, and to further my design abilities. I strongly suggest that you talk to Dr. Garber about this opportunity, regardless of your specific interest in international development, because it's such good workplace training. If you are

interested in development work, IDEAS will be a place where you can put your theories and classroom experience to good use.

What my experience meant to me and my professional development: Working at IDEAS helped me understand what it was like to work at a true international economic development nonprofit. Because of the multitude of different projects that the organization takes on at any given time, I was exposed to numerous experiences that each helped create social value for a different subset of individuals. Products created:

- Evaluation research and program development for the TecAp program in Nicaragua (TecAp = Technology that is Appropriate), including interview, survey and focus group guides for community partners, leaders of coffee coops, women's organizations, fair trade certifiers, and clients of TecAp's microfranchise project
- Special interest articles for magazines, blogs and websites concerning IDEAS programs that promote solar energy and gender equality in fair trade coffee cooperatives
- Documented experience through photographs and videos
- Contributed to grant proposal to train youth as solar technicians and microfranchisees



<u>Worked</u>: Spent 6 weeks in Esteli, Nicaragua with TecAp staff and volunteers doing field work, and parttime virtually at home

Language: collected information in Spanish, wrote documents in English, and communicated in both

<u>What it meant to me and my professional development</u>: This was my first experience working for an international non-profit, so it was a chance to apply concepts learned in the classroom to the real world. But I also learned skills that only practical experience can give, such as teamwork, flexibility and creativity in project management, and research methods. The materials that I created not only showcase my writing and professional interests, but inform others about IDEAS' work and important development trends.

Working with IDEAS was invaluable because the staff supported me and ensured that the experience was mutually beneficial. The information I collected and the relationships I forged in Nicaragua and with IDEAS will make doing further research and projects in the area much easier.

<u>Other comments</u>: There are many different kinds of people and needs in development work, both at home and abroad. Anyone with access to the internet and a little patience can develop personal and professional relationships and contribute to projects anywhere in the world. IDEAS has a place for many kinds of volunteers and will help you figure out what you're good at and where you can contribute the most – which is what good development programming is all about.

Worked: Part-time, virtual work from home.

<u>Language</u>: I did about half of my work in English and half in Spanish, and helped with the translation of various documents and presentations. Language skills are not mandatory but could definitely be helpful.

<u>What it meant to me and my professional development</u>: Volunteering for IDEAS was a great experience for me. First of all, having done most of my research and work for projects in the countries of El Salvador and Nicaragua gave me a better understanding of the role that social enterprise and nonprofit organizations are playing in the development of these neighboring countries of mine.
